

Anthi Revithiadou, currently a Professor of Linguistics (with specialization in Phonology & Morphophonology) at the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, received her Ph.D. from Leiden University/HIL in 1999 (Ph.D. thesis: Headmost Accent Wins). Her research interests focus on phonological theory (metrical and prosodic phonology), the morphosyntax-phonology interface, language typology,

and language contact. She also has a profound interest in contact-induced systems and, especially, endangered varieties of Greek that have been in long-term contact with Turkish (e.g., Asia Minor Greek, Ofitika Pontic, Rhodian Muslim Greek).

She has conducted three fieldwork trips in Nea Trapezounta on Ofitika Pontic (2003, 2006, 2009) and three fieldwork trips in Symi on Symi Greek (2002, 2006, 2007). She has participated as a researcher or scientific coordinator in several projects focusing on Greek dialects and Greek-Turkish language contact. In 2009, she received the Studies 2009/Μελέτες 2009 research grant (Project: Ofitika Pontic: A Documentation Project with Special Emphasis on the Diachrony and Synchrony of the Dialect, Funding ID 2128) by the John S. Latsis Public Benefit Foundation. In 2008, she was awarded the Fulbright Research Grant (Fulbright Foundation, Athens) to carry out research on Ancient Greek stress at MIT (USA).

She is a reviewer for international journals such as *Lingua, Phonology, Natural Language and Linguistic Theory, The Linguistic Review, Natural Language and Linguistic Theory,* and *Journal of Greek Linguistics* (Member of the Editorial Board since 2009). She has published five books, seven edited volumes, 22 articles in journals, and over 50 articles in scientific journals, peer-reviewed volumes, and proceedings. She has presented her work at more than 100 international conferences, workshops, and colloquia. She has been invited to present her work and give lectures at universities in Europe and the USA.

From September 2010 to November 2014 she was the Project Leader of Action 5: Reinforcement of the Mother Tongue in the Program Education of Immigrant and Repatriate Students (Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, Funding IDs: 85705, 86040, 86041). Currently, she is the Principal Investigator of the project GRADIENCE (Modeling the limits of grammar: Integrating lexical frequency in a Gradient Harmonic model of lexical stress; Evidence from young and adult Greek speakers' grammars; H.F.R.I. ID 15053, R.C. A.U.Th. ID: 76809), which aims at computationally modelling of nominal stress by young and adult speakers of Greek.
